Finances

We took a big hit on investments and had full staffing levels but lower attendance at programs, causing a significant deficit.

Total assets are \$1,417,268 and total liabilities are \$19,050. Income was \$359,301 and expenses were \$545,097. Loss on value of investments was \$104,007. Depreciation expense was \$63,608. Lehigh County provided \$161,479. Allentown provided \$15,000 and Mayor Matt Tuerk donated \$9,000 through his annual charity golf tournament. Other municipalities donated \$16,150. Fees for programs brought in \$127,958. Membership dues raised \$9,817. Harry C. Trexler Trust donated \$25,000. United Way provided \$22,898 for fall prevention efforts.
